work with on a proclamation. He commented that they were trying to see if they could put something together quickly, noting that her birthday was on July 15, and he hoped that there could be approval for a proclamation on the current day, relaying that her rabbi would like to present her with something on July 12, 2024.

The Board approved to add a proclamation for Ms. Edith Freiwirth, a Holocaust survivor, to the current agenda. The Board then approved Proclamation 2024-99 to honor Ms. Freiwirth, and to direct the County Attorney to draft the proclamation for the Commissioners' signatures.

Mr. Marty Proctor, a resident of Lake County, said that since 2020, the county had 41,000 new residents, which was more than a 10 percent increase. He opined that there was an attraction to Lake County, and he asked the Board to do everything in their power to keep it close and natural. He then opined that the budget process was difficult and that even though some of the numbers may possibly be unpleasant to present to the public, there were 10 percent more residents than three years prior. He opined that they wanted to maintain their quality of life, and that the Board had his support and the support of many other people in the county to do what they had to do to maintain quality of life for current and future residents. He also opined that this was likely the most important primary election in the 40 years that he lived in Lake County, commenting that the primaries were generally closed. He encouraged the Board to share with their constituents the importance of voting in this primary and voting intelligently.

Mr. Mike Trainor, a resident of the City of Tavares, opined that this primary was important for all voters, not just voters of a particular party. He added that there were several universal primary questions on the ballot, especially having to do with judgeships. He opined that it was important for all voters, regardless of party designation, to vote.

She said that she wanted to provide them for the Board to consider, recalling that she had previously said that she had not wanted to do this too early because she wanted it to be at a time when people were preparing to vote on these items. She mentioned that this would be on the November 2024 ballot, and that she wanted to ensure that the Board could potentially take a position before early voting would occur. She also stated that she had proposed in her language to highlight what the terminology really meant. She relayed that when discussing viability, one was discussing a time when a baby could survive outside of the mother's womb; furthermore, she opined that abortion that was allowed up until viability meant that one was aborting a baby at a time when the baby could live outside the mother's womb. She expressed concerns for this, and opined that many people did not understand that this was what it was about. She also opined that it allowed non-physicians to decide whether it was for the mother's health, not to protect the mother's life, remarking that Roe v. Wade was if the mother's life was in balance. She opined that this was why this was an extreme law, and she indicated concerns for putting this in the Constitution. She said that she was a proponent of moderation, and that she thought that she would be more in favor of something that was moderate and took into consideration trying to moderate the government's interference. She opined that Amendment 4 was contrary to living in a civilized society, and she expressed concerns for allowing children to be aborted when they could live outside a mother's womb. She reiterated her request for the Board to consider this, and she suggested that they select a date to include this on the agenda in mid to
