| | CITIZEN QUESTION AND COMMENT PERIOD | |
| | Mr. Mike Henleben, with the Kiwanis Club of South Lake, said that his organization had been trying for a few years to have an inclusive playground built in South Lake. He indicated that they had raised much funding and had received grants and donations, along with his club contributing \$10,000; however, they were about \$110,000 short. He mentioned that the playground would be at Lake Felter Park, and he asked the Board to consider this, opining that it was needed in South Lake. | |
| | Ms. Renee Lowe, with the Kiwanis Club of South Lake, opined that it was a passion for children in South Lake to have a playground. She mentioned that it was a park for children with special needs to play with their families, and she asked the Board for their support to help finish this park and bring it to South Lake. | |
| | Mr. Mike Trainor, a resident of the City of Tavares, spoke about a recent Lake County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) memorial service, opining that something had changed in Lake County. He then mentioned that he was one of the assistant clerks at the early voting location in the City of Mount Dora, and that on the previous day, a typically busy early voting location had only 124 votes in an election that he opined had candidates that threatened the future of the community. He opined that Master Deputy Sheriff Bradley Link's tragic death and the lack of voters showing up for such an important election indicated that they needed to make some changes in the community. He opined that it was time to call for an exploratory committee to see what could be done and to utilize every resource of the County, along with the Lake County School Board's educational resources and the Lake County Supervisor of Elections Office's outreach to voters. He opined that County buildings could advertise the need for civic involvement, and that County vehicles could possibly have a slogan. | |
| | Ms. Kathryn Wilgus, with Villagers for Veterans, said that her organization was a $501(c)(3)$ nonprofit 100 percent volunteer organization. She mentioned that they had earned the platinum level of the GuideStar seal of | |

transparency, and she thanked Commissioner Shields for making them aware of the Office of Housing and Community Services, noting that the office was going to connect them with the Office of Veterans Services. She indicated that she had distributed materials for the Board to be aware of her organization, recalling that almost three years prior they decided to bring Ashley's House, their transition home for homeless women veterans, to Lake County. She commented that they started in January 2024, and that they currently had the house in a contractor status. She stated that with the delays and the increased costs of materials, they would like to determine how they could receive support from the County to complete this project. She mentioned that they were also working with the Mid Florida Homeless Coalition, who had collected data in the previous month indicating that Lake County, out of Marion, Sumter and Citrus Counties, had an increased uptick in homeless women veterans. She said that they had joined other organizations helping their male and female counterparts get off the streets into hotels so that they could be assessed for their supportive services for veteran families (SSVF) benefits. She said that the Mid Florida Homeless Coalition's mission included promoting partnerships which would reduce and prevent homelessness in Citrus, Hernando, Lake and Sumter Counties, and that at their monthly disciplinary meeting in the previous month, they shared that they had a higher intake of women veterans, noting that they did not understand why. She commented that Villagers for Veterans had been working with veterans affairs (VA) in The Villages, the City of Gainesville, and Lake Nona for women veteran referrals, in addition to local churches and different community outreach programs. She remarked that the Ashley's House program was being modeled off Liberty Manor for male veterans in the City of Tampa which, since 2005, promoted the developmental and social needs of disabled honorably discharged veterans who had fallen victim to homelessness by providing them transitional supportive housing, and established objective design to attribute to self-sufficiency. She related that her organization was also trying to offer the same opportunity to women veterans who had served their country honorably, and she asked if the County could help them find a way to bring this project to the community.

Mr. Vance Jochim, a concerned citizen, opined that every pasture in the State of Florida did not have to be developed with a subdivision. He then provided a list of his voting recommendations and some comments, and opined that the City of Tavares had failed to maintain the docks at Tavares Nature Park; furthermore, he opined that if a fallen tree was encountered, the City did not do anything for around two weeks. He opined that the County needed to set some standards if they were going to provide funding to anyone who would create a public land, and that it should be available for public use. He opined that the Cities should be mandated to show that they were setting aside a maintenance and development budget, and he requested that the County do a study of the existing public lands and see if they had been maintained.
